WE HEAR AND RESPOND TO THE WORD

CHURCH FAMILY MOMENT

- 1. We are nearing the end of our exploration of worship. Last Sunday, we talked about the offertory. Right after the offertory, we sing the doxology and pray the prayer of dedication. As we offer our gifts for God's service, we praise God for letting us have use of all the resources the Lord has provided for us, and we praise God for the opportunity to serve on God's behalf. The Doxology is an ancient chorus of praise with a vision of joining all the created beings of all times and places who forever sing praise to God. (Imagine joining the grand chorus of praise ringing through all of creation.) Then, we say a prayer to dedicate our offering to the work of God in the world.
- 2. In our Gospel reading, John the Baptist uses his voice to share with people who Jesus is and what he has done. Tomorrow is the day we celebrate and remember the life of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. MLK used his voice to change the world. In his book, *Say Something*, Peter Reynolds encourages each of us to use our voices, too. Listen to the book, and then use the activity sheets to say something!
- 3. Look at the Gospel reading. How many names is Jesus given? What are they? How about Peter? Ask someone in your family about your name. Where did it come from? Why did your parents choose it for you? What do the names of Jesus in the passage mean to you? Make a poster with your name on it!
- 4. Journal, considering the following:
 - a. I wonder why John the Baptist referred to Jesus as The Lamb of God...
 - b. I wonder how John might have explained what happened at the Baptism of Jesus to a reporter who was trying to understand...
 - c. I wonder why Jesus gave Simon the name Cephas...
 - d. What name would you give Jesus?

READING FROM THE OLD TESTAMENT

I waited patiently for the Lord; he inclined to me and heard my cry. He drew me up from the desolate pit, out of the miry bog, and set my feet upon a rock, making my steps secure. He put a new song in my mouth, a song of praise to our God. Many will see and fear, and put their trust in the Lord. Happy are those who make the Lord their trust, who do not turn to the proud, to those who go astray after false gods. You have multiplied, O Lord my God, your wondrous deeds and your thoughts toward us; none can compare with you. Were I to proclaim and tell of them, they would be more than can be counted. Sacrifice and offering you do not desire, but you have given me an open ear. Burnt offering and sin offering you have not required. Then I said, "Here I am; in the scroll of the book it is written of me.

READING FROM THE GOSPELS

The next day he saw Jesus coming toward him and declared, "Here is the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world! This is he of whom I said, 'After me comes a man who ranks ahead of me because he was before me.' I myself did not know him; but I came baptizing with water for this reason, that he might be revealed to Israel." And John testified, "I saw the Spirit descending from heaven like a dove, and it remained on him. I myself did not know him, but the one who sent me to baptize with water said to me, 'He on whom you see the Spirit descend and remain is the one who baptizes with the Holy Spirit.' And I myself have seen and have testified that this is the Son of God." The next day John again was standing with two of his disciples, and as he watched Jesus walk by, he exclaimed, "Look, here is the Lamb of God!" The two disciples heard him say this, and they followed Jesus. When Jesus turned and saw them following, he said to them, "What are you looking for?" They said to him, "Rabbi" (which translated means Teacher), "where are you staying?" He said to them, "Come and see." They came and saw where he was staying, and they remained with him that day. It was about four o'clock in the afternoon. One of the two who heard John speak and followed him was Andrew, Simon Peter's brother. He first found his brother Simon and said to him, "We have found the Messiah" (which is translated Anointed). He brought Simon to Jesus, who looked at him and said, "You are Simon son of John. You are to be called Cephas" (which is translated Peter).

One: This is the word of the Lord.

All: Thanks be to God.
