- In the passage from Lamentations, the writer has been through a very difficult time. In <u>The Rough Patch</u> by Brian Lies, Evan loses his dog. He is devastated, but he eventually comes to understand that there is beauty even in the bleakest places. Similarly, the writer of Lamentations comes to realize that God has not abandoned him and sits with him in his grief and sadness. Listen to the book and consider how God is with us, even in our worst moments.
- 2. The passage from Hebrews lists several "Faith Heroes." Think about your faith heroes. Who are they? Maybe your faith hero is someone who is well-known like Ghandi or Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Perhaps your faith hero is someone who isn't famous! Draw a picture or write about your faith hero and why you admire them so much.
- 3. Sing along to this hymn and think about who your "saints" are.
- 4. Journal, considering the following:
 - a. How do you know God is with you in your sadness?
 - b. Where do you find hope? What gives you hope?
 - c. Who are your faith heroes?

But this I call to mind, and therefore I have hope: The steadfast love of the Lord never ceases, his mercies never come to an end; they are new every morning; great is your faithfulness. "The Lord is my portion," says my soul, "therefore I will hope in him." The Lord is good to those who wait for him, to the soul that seeks him. It is good that one should wait quietly for the salvation of the Lord. It is good for one to bear the yoke in youth, to sit alone in silence when the Lord has imposed it, to put one's mouth to the dust (there may yet be hope), to give one's cheek to the smiter, and be filled with insults. For the Lord will not reject forever. Although he causes grief, he will have compassion according to the abundance of his steadfast love; for he does not willingly afflict or grieve anyone.
