- 1. It's Palm Sunday! In recent years, many churches have begun to call today Palm/Passion Sunday. Palm/Passion Sunday begins Holy Week, a time in the church year when we remember how Christ gave his life in love for the world. As this service opens, the crowd waves palm branches, wanting to crown Jesus as king. But as the story of the passion unfolds, their shouts of praise turn to demands for his crucifixion; he receives a crown of thorns as he is handed over to be arrested and killed. As you came in, you received a palm branch. Don't be afraid to wave it!
- 2. If you are worshiping from home, you might enjoy this Page. Cut it out and join with us in waving our palms! You could also make a simple palm branch from green construction paper or draw and cut out your own palm branch. All this week, consider reading passages from the Gospel of Matthew.
- 3. Check out this <u>Palm Sunday video</u>. What do you notice in the video? After you watch the video, act out the story of Palm Sunday.
- 4. Journal, considering the following:
 - a. What does it mean to you that Jesus is the Good Shepherd?
 - b. How do you feel when you think about Jesus laying down his life for you?
 - c. How can you help the world experience the unity or "oneness" that Jesus talks about in John?
