

# We Hear and Respond to the Word

#### **Church Family Moment**

Today's Church Family Moment is based on the April Edition of the Year of Justice, a resource developed by Lindsey Odom that gives families ways to engage as Christians with one justice issue each month. April's focus is Creation Care in honor of Earth Day.

- 1. If you are worshiping from home, listen to this <u>readaloud</u> of Brother Sun, Sister Moon by Katherine Paterson. Originally a prayer of St. Francis, this poem was adapted by the author and illustrated by Pamela Dalton. This book nurtures thankfulness and gratitude as it praises God for God giving creation variety, beauty, and bounty. And within this sweep of praise, the author also includes those who are sick, suffering, or facing death. What are some ways you can praise God for God's gift of creation?
- 2. Share your favorite memories of being outside or what your favorite thing about nature is to a friend or family member. Connecting with creation and being reminded of God's goodness is a powerful way to motivate ourselves and others to care for God's creation.
- 3. Draw or collect pictures of things within God's creation for which you praise God. Make a collage.
- 4. Journal, considering the following:
  - a. Why do some people take care of God's creation while others do not care for it?
  - b. What does it mean to care for God's creation? What about the people that God has created?
  - c. What is one thing you would like to begin doing to care for God's creation?

#### **Reading from the Old Testament**

Psalm 111

fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom; all those who practice it have a good understanding. His praise endures forever.

### **Reading from the Gospels**

John 20: 19-31

When it was evening on that day, the first day of the week, and the doors of the house where the disciples had met were locked for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." After he said this, he showed them his hands and his side. Then the disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord. Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you." When he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained." But Thomas (who was called the Twin), one of the twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. So the other disciples told him, "We have seen the Lord." But he said to them, "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands, and put my finger in the mark of the nails and my hand in his side, I will not believe." A week later his disciples were again in the house, and Thomas was with them. Although the doors were shut, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here and see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it in my side. Do not doubt but believe." Thomas answered him, "My Lord and my God!" Jesus said to him, "Have you believed because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe." Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of his disciples, which are not written in this book. But these are written so that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that through believing you may have life in his name.

Jesus is our living Lord. Jesus was dead and buried, but God raised him from the dead. The risen Lord appeared to his followers. They recognized him as their Master who had been crucified. Before Jesus left them, he commissioned them to proclaim to all people the good news of his victory over death, and promised to be with them always. We are certain that Jesus lives. He lives as God with us, touching all of human life with the presence of God. He lives as one of us with God. Because he shares our humanity and has bound us to himself in love, we have an advocate in the innermost life of God. We declare that Jesus is Lord. His resurrection is a decisive victory over the powers that deform and destroy human life. His lordship is hidden. The world appears to be dominated by people and systems that do not

acknowledge his rule. But his lordship is real. It demands our loyalty and sets us free from the fear of all lesser lords who threaten us. We maintain that ultimate sovereignty now belongs to Jesus Christ in every sphere of life. Jesus is Lord. He has been Lord from the beginning. He will be Lord at the end. Even now he is Lord.


