1. Today could perhaps be called "Good Shepherd Sunday," even though that isn't a real name. Both of our scripture passages talk

about God as a shepherd. Do some research to find out what a shepherd really does, both now and in Bible times.

- 2. Look at this <u>piece of art</u>, which is widely regarded as the very first picture of Jesus we have. It was painted in the ceiling of the catacombs where the first Christians hid to worship God because they were in danger because of their faith. Why do you think the artist chose to paint Jesus as a strong shepherd? When are some times you might need a strong shepherd? Draw your own picture of Jesus as a shepherd.
- In the passage from 1 Peter, we are reminded that Jesus chose restoration over revenge, and that we are invited to make this same choice. He chose to fix a relationship instead of getting even. In the book *Boundless Grace*, Grace also chooses forgiveness. <u>Listen to a readaloud</u> of the story and consider what it means to choose restoration.
- 4. Journal, considering the following:
 - a. What does it mean to think of Jesus as both a shepherd and a lamb?
 - b. How can we choose restoration over revenge?
 - c. When do you need God to be a strong shepherd for you?

But if you endure when you do right and suffer for it, you have God's approval. When he was abused, he did not return abuse; when he suffered, he did not threaten; but he entrusted himself to the one who judges justly. He himself bore our sins in his body on the cross, so that, free from sins, we might live for righteousness; by his wounds you have been healed. For you were going astray like sheep, but now you have returned to the shepherd and guardian of your souls.
