

We Hear and Respond to the Word

Church Family Moment

- 1. Today's parable is about different kinds of seeds and how they grow. Try this game where you can grow a plant! What does it take to grow a plant? What does a plant need? What does a person need to grow in faith? Why do you think Jesus described faith as a seed?
- 2. Listen to a readaloud of *The Tiny Seed* by Eric Carle. Follow the journey of seeds blowing in the wind. Many of the seeds and plants don't survive the journey though the seasons, but the tiny seed grows big and begins the cycle of life again. As you listen, imagine yourself as one of the seeds sown by the sower. What would it be like to suffer poor growing conditions versus being sown in good soil, to grow big and beautiful like the tiny seed?
- 3. Just like the farmer who planted seeds, we have many opportunities to learn new things every day. To grow and become wise, we should listen carefully and be curious about the world around us. To be curious about the world, go on a nature walk! Take a small basket or bag to collect interesting things you find, like leaves, flowers, or rocks. Pay attention to the colors, shapes, and textures of the objects you discover.
- 4. Finally, journal, considering the following:
 - a. What questions does this scripture passage bring up for you?
 - b. Who do you think the sower might be? What kind of seeds do you think they are scattering?
 - c. If the seeds are God's word, I wonder what we can do to take care of them...
 - d. I wonder what the path, rocky ground, thorny ground, and good soil might look like?

Reading from the Old Testament

Isaiah 55:10-13

For as the rain and the snow come down from heaven, and do not return there until they have watered the earth, making it bring forth and sprout, giving seed to the sower and bread to the eater, so shall my word be that goes out from my mouth; it shall not return to me empty, but it shall accomplish that which I purpose, and succeed in the thing for which I sent it. For you shall go out in joy, and be led back in peace; the mountains and the hills before you shall burst into song, and all the trees of the field shall clap their hands. Instead of the thorn shall come up the cypress; instead of the brier shall come up the myrtle; and it shall be to the Lord for a memorial, for an everlasting sign that shall not be cut off.

Reading from the Gospels

Matthew 13:1-9, 18-23

That same day Jesus went out of the house and sat beside the sea. Such great crowds gathered around him that he got into a boat and sat there, while the whole crowd stood on the beach. And he told them many things in parables, saying: "Listen! A sower went out to sow. And as he sowed, some seeds fell on the path, and the birds came and ate them up. Other seeds fell on rocky ground, where they did not have much soil, and they sprang up quickly, since they had no depth of soil. But when the sun rose, they were scorched; and since they had no root, they withered away. Other seeds fell among thorns, and the thorns grew up and choked them. Other seeds fell on good soil and brought forth grain, some a hundredfold, some sixty, some thirty. Let anyone with ears listen!"

"Hear then the parable of the sower. When anyone hears the word of the kingdom and does not understand it, the evil one comes and snatches away what is sown in the heart; this is what was sown on the path. As for what was sown on rocky ground, this is the one who hears the word and immediately receives it with joy; yet such a person has no root, but endures only for a while, and when trouble or persecution arises on account of the word, that person immediately falls away. As for what was sown among thorns, this is the one who hears the word, but the cares of the world and the lure of wealth choke the word, and it yields nothing. But as for what was sown on good soil, this is the one who hears the word and understands it, who indeed bears fruit and yields, in one case a hundredfold, in another sixty, and in another thirty."

One: This is the word of the Lord.

All: Thanks be to God.

Sermon Shall We Understand? Dr. Brown

Jesus announced the coming of God's kingdom and its hidden presence in the midst of the world's kingdoms. He taught his disciples to seek God's kingdom first. We believe Christ gives us and demands of us lives in pilgrimage toward God's kingdom. Like Christ we may enjoy on our journey all that sustains life and makes it pleasant and beautiful.
