- 1. Look at the <u>illustration of the Gospel story</u> by Jesus MAFA. Jesus MAFA is a response to the New Testament readings from the Lectionary by a Christian community in Cameroon, Africa. Each of the readings was selected and adapted to dramatic interpretation by the community members. Photographs of their interpretations were made, and these were then transcribed to paintings. First find Jesus, then notice what various people in the painting are doing. Where are the disciples? What color are they wearing? What do you think this event was like for the different people who were there?
- 2. One way that people have been talking about the way that people think in recent years is called "scarcity vs. abundance." Even though this is a newer way of thinking, it is based on a very OLD way of thinking—one that we see in the Bible story today! Basically, people who have a scarcity mindset think that there's not enough to go around—not enough food, opportunities, justice, etc. So then they have to get what they need first, before others get to it. People with an abundance mindset know that there is enough to go around. There is enough food, enough opportunity, enough justice, enough everything, as long as we share it. Which mindset do you think Jesus has? Especially considering this story, what makes you think so? Do some googling about these two ways of thinking about the world and consider what Christians might be called to do.
- 3. <u>Loaves and Fishes</u> is an organization here in Charlotte that helps people who don't have enough to eat. Why do you think they chose this name? Click the link and learn more about this Mission Partner and how you might be helpful to them!
- 4. Journal, considering the following:
 - a. What questions does this story bring up for you?
 - b. This is a well-known story. What did you hear differently this time?
 - c. This is a miracle story. What miracles have you witnessed in your life?
 - d. Where or what are you being fed that you did not expect to be fed?





Important Update on SMPC Missions/Outreach

Thanks to the generosity of SMPC members and friends, we were able to quickly respond to two important missions and outreach needs in the last week!

SMPC responded immediately to Charlotte's food insecurity crisis with a \$1,000 donation to Loaves and Fishes. In addition, SMPC collected 324 pounds of food for Loaves and Fishes from Vacation Bible School/Mission Possible donations! Our Mission Possible youth delivered the food as part of their week of service.

Also last week SMPC funded a critical need for our friends at OFCB Ministries, a church/school in Haiti. SMPC sent \$3520 to help fund school operations and school food for the month of August. This is in addition to the normal funding to OFCB from our SMPC Mission Budget.
