We Hear and Respond to the Word

Church Family Moment

1. Listen to a <u>readaloud</u> of the book *I Can't Believe You Said That!* by Julia Cook. In the book, RJ just says whatever he is thinking out loud, without considering how it might feel to hear his words. His parents teach him to use a filter to sort his "thinking bubble" words and

- decide which ones belong in his "talking bubble." In our Gospel passage for today, Jesus gives us a similar filter and reminds us that our words matter.
- 2. Look at this <u>piece of art</u> painted by Keith Haring as part of his illustration of the Ten Commandments. What does it say about the power of our words? What kinds of words do you think the snakes represent?
- 3. Get some practice with using words that build one another up! Draw a picture or make a list of ways that you can use your words to show love and kindness to someone else. Write a note to someone about the lovely things you have noticed about them. Write down the things that you are grateful for. Jesus says that what comes out of our mouths reveals what's in our hearts, but it works the other way too—when we decide that we will only let good words come out of our mouths, our hearts are also changed.
- 4. Journal, considering the following:
 - a. The Old Testament has lots of cleanliness rules, the rules about what one should eat and not eat. How do you think the people felt when Jesus said that these rules didn't matter? Do you think they felt confused, angry, relieved?
 - b. What does Jesus say matters? Do words matter for us today?
 - c. What do the words we choose tell people about who we are?

Reading from the Epistles

James 3: 5-12

So also the tongue is a small member, yet it boasts of great exploits. How great a forest is set ablaze by a small fire! And the tongue is a fire. The tongue is placed among our members as a world of iniquity; it stains the whole body, sets on fire the cycle of nature, and is itself set on fire by hell. For every species of beast and bird, of reptile and sea creature, can be tamed and has been tamed by the human species, but no one can tame the tongue—a restless evil, full of deadly poison. With it we bless the Lord and Father, and with it we curse those who are made in the likeness of God. From the same mouth come blessing and cursing. My brothers and sisters, this ought not to be so. Does a spring pour forth from the same opening both fresh and brackish water? Can a fig tree, my brothers and

sisters, yield olives, or a grapevine figs? No more can salt water yield fresh.

Reading from the Gospels

Matthew 15: 10-20

Then he called the crowd to him and said to them, "Listen and understand: it is not what goes into the mouth that defiles a person, but it is what comes out of the mouth that defiles." Then the disciples approached and said to him, "Do you know that the Pharisees took offense when they heard what you said?" He answered, "Every plant that my heavenly Father has not planted will be uprooted. Let them alone; they are blind guides of the blind. And if one blind person guides another, both will fall into a pit." But Peter said to him, "Explain this parable to us." Then he said, "Are you also still without understanding? Do you not see that whatever goes into the mouth enters the stomach, and goes out into the sewer? But what comes out of the mouth proceeds from the heart, and this is what defiles. For out of the heart come evil intentions, murder, adultery, fornication, theft, false witness, slander. These are what defile a person, but to eat with unwashed hands does not defile."
