- 1. Listen to a <u>readaloud</u> of *Roller* Coaster by Marla Frazee. In the Gospel reading today we find three men that have been trusted with masters' money. Each servant must choose how much risk they are willing to take. Two of them choose to risk it all to double it, and one chooses to risk very little and keep it safe. When we choose the risk we are rewarded in some way. The men who risked it all are rewarded by their master, and the little girl who rode the roller coaster for the first time is rewarded with enjoyment. When we don't take the risk we miss out on something, like the servant who hid his money.
- 2. Our gifts and talents are given to us by God, and we honor God when we use them. For youth and adults, a spiritual gifts inventory is a great way to discern where and how God might be calling us to serve. Take this <u>online</u> one and think about what it might mean for you!
- 3. Thanksgiving is this week! Print and color this <u>Thanksgiving coloring</u> <u>page</u> and consider what you are grateful to God for giving you. As you pray, thank God for the many blessings that you have in your life!
- 4. Journal, considering the following:
 - a. Why do you think the master gave the servants money to take care of?
 - b. What do you think it felt like to be one of the servants who was praised for growing the gift? How about the one who did not?
 - c. Do you have gifts that you can use to serve God? What are they?

"For it is as if a man, going on a journey, summoned his slaves and entrusted his property to them; to one he gave five talents, to another two, to another one, to each according to his ability. Then he went away. The one who had received the five talents went off at once and traded with them, and made five more talents. In the same way, the one who had the two talents made two more talents. But the one who had received the one talent went off and dug a hole in the ground and hid his master's money.

After a long time the master of those slaves came and settled accounts with them. Then the one who had received the five talents came forward, bringing five more talents, saying, 'Master, you handed over to me five talents; see, I have made five more talents.' His master said to him, 'Well one, good and trustworthy slave; you have been trustworthy in a few things, I will put you in charge of many things; enter into the joy of your master.' And the one with the two talents also came forward, saying, 'Master, you handed over to me two talents; see, I have made two more talents.' His master said to him, 'Well done, good and trustworthy slave; you have been trustworthy in a few things, I will put you in charge of many things; enter into the joy of your master.'

Then the one who had received the one talent also came forward, saying, 'Master, I knew that you were a harsh man, reaping where you did not sow, and gathering where you did not scatter seed; so I was afraid, and I went and hid your talent in the ground. Here you have what is yours.'

But his master replied, 'You wicked and lazy slave! You knew, did you, that I reap where I did not sow, and gather where I did not scatter? Then you ought to have invested my money with the bankers, and on my return I would have received what was my own with interest. So take the talent from him, and give it to the one with the ten talents. For to all those who have, more will be given, and they will have an abundance; but from those who have nothing, even what they have will be taken away. As for this worthless slave, throw him into the outer darkness, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth.'
