 - a. Why do you think Jesus was gathering all of these people?
 - b. Philip was eager to join Jesus, but Nathanael was not so sure. Who do you think you would have been like? What might have been Nathanael's decision if Philip had not been there to encourage him?
 - c. Notice that in the story, when Jesus calls someone, that person goes and tells someone else. Who told us about Jesus? Who might have told them?
