

Church Family Moment

- In just the first three verses of our Psalm today, God is rock, fortress, and refuge. Look up pictures of these three things and think about what their purposes are. After you figure that out, make a list of the ways that God is like each one of these things. This link might help you to think about the ways that God is our rock.
- 2. Print and color this art that reminds us that God is our fortress. As you color, consider what that means. You can even use coloring as a time of silent prayer. Sometimes, if we are very quiet, even in our minds, God will speak to us.
- 3. Listen to a <u>readloud</u> of *The Happy Owls* by Celestino Piatti. Our passage in Philippians highlights the importance of finding joy in life, giving thanks rather than worrying as we approach God in prayer. In the story, the owls share similar wisdom about finding joy with the other birds. What other connections do you see?
- 4. Journal, considering the following:
 - a. What does it mean to think about God as our rock, fortress, and refuge? How have you experienced God in one of these ways?
 - b. Where do you think true joy comes from? How can you cultivate joy?
 - c. How can we put our trust in God, rather than in things that will ultimately fail us?

For God alone my soul waits in silence; from him comes my salvation. He alone is my rock and my salvation, my fortress; I shall never be shaken. How long will you assail a person, will you batter your victim, all of you, as you would a leaning wall, a tottering fence? Their only plan is to bring down a person of prominence. They take pleasure in falsehood; they bless with their mouths, but inwardly they curse. For God alone my soul waits in silence, for my hope is from him. He alone is my rock and my salvation, my fortress; I shall not be shaken. On God rests my deliverance and my honor; my mighty rock, my refuge is in God. Trust in him at all times, O people; pour out your heart before him; God is a refuge for us. Those of low estate are but a breath, those of high estate are a delusion; in the balances they go up; they are together lighter than a breath. Put no confidence in extortion, and set no vain hopes on robbery; if riches increase, do not set your heart on them.
