

In celebration of Black History Month, we will hear music from composers of African descent each Sunday in February. Today, our postlude is based on hymn 273, an African American Spiritual. This spiritual is a classic example of how praise of God rises out of human experience. The repeated response "no one works like him" shows confidence that the sovereign, liberating Christ abounds with the very attribute the singers need in order to survive. The composer, Ralph Simpson, was an active organist, composer/arranger, and retired chairman of the Department of Music at Tennessee State University. A native of Birmingham, Alabama, he was the first African American to earn a Ph.D. in music from Michigan State University. He also taught at Alabama State University, Dillard University and Fisk University.

A note to parents: We are so delighted that you and your children are here! Children are an integral part of our faith community, and we strive to support parents during worship. Here are some helpful things to know:

- During worship, the service is broadcast to the parlor, where there is more space to move around if your little one becomes restless.
