


MONTREAT SMPC YOUTH REFLECTIONS

Montreat was one of the most fabulous weeks of the year!! We began each day with energizers, worship, keynote, small group, and prayed and experienced God's peace in new and meaningful ways. The theme of the week was "Planting Peace." The theme was divided into four key words: "peace, plant, prune and persist," for focus during worship, keynotes, small group time, and outside recreation time. These four key words: "peace, plant, prune and persist," conveyed larger theological statements for the youth to ponder on as they consider God's peace and how God calls them into the work of peace. I loved this theme because it gave youth an opportunity to dig deep into the meaning of peace and learn how they can spread peace around to others. It also allowed them to determine where they experience peace and what gets in the way of them experiencing peace. Because by determining the source of peace in their own lives, which is in and through Jesus Christ, they can then work together to provide peace for others and create a world where all can thrive and live in peace and harmony with each other.

Montreat compared us creating peace to the process of planting a plant from a tiny seed. Once a seed is planted and it has all the nutrients it needs, it has the potential to become whatever it wants or can become. In the same way, we all have the ability to plant peace and plant seeds of hope, ideas, justice, compassion, care, and service, and make a difference in our world. But we also have to let go and put our seeds in a place where God can use them and do something miraculous with them. So, what are you going to plant and who is your seed going to impact? What will happen when your seed blossoms into something else? There has never been a more perfect time to plant. Our world needs us to plant peace, love, justice, and hope. We plant peace, not only because God calls us to, but because it is an act of faith. Planting seeds of peace allows us to become co-creators with God in creating a world that matches with God's vision for all of humanity. Even when times get difficult or are unjust, we must persist in our work of creating peace for all God's people to experience and enjoy. We are diverse and different from each other, but we are called to be together and live in community with each other. We are taught to live peaceably with all, even when things in our world are not peaceful. For as our Keynoter John Moore reminded us, "God does not erase our differences; God erases our divisions." Jesus brought peace and still continues to provide us with the gift of peace, breaking down the walls of hostility and division that separate us from each other. In response, we must recognize that the harvest of peace is for everyone to experience and enjoy, and work to create peace for all.

Some of the highlights from the week included our hike to Lookout Mountain, the keynote messages, worship, recreation events, and our back home time with just our SMPC youth group. I am so extremely blessed to be the youth pastor at SMPC and be able to help lead these youth on their faith journey and to lead them to experiencing God's peace and how God calls them into the work of peace. It was truly a gift to be with all of the youth this past week at Montreat. They make my job so easy. Montreat is always such an amazing and fun retreat. I am so inspired by SMPC youth and their faith and the way they love each other, look after one another, and treat each other like family. Very thankful to experience this week at Montreat alongside SMPC youth and chaperones and see how they connected with each other and connected with God and learned about God's peace and how to spread God's peace to all whom they encounter!! 
