Church Family Moment

- 1. Read Aloud: In today's story, Jesus reminds us that life is not about storing up stuff just for ourselves. The Biggest House in the World by Leo Lionni tells of a snail who keeps building a bigger and fancier shell until it's so heavy, he can't move at all. It's a story within a story—just like Jesus' parable—and it helps us think about what really matters. Watch the readaloud here. (Thanks to Carolyn C. Brown at worshipingwithchildren.com)
- **2. Game:** Play this simple online game to sort what we need versus what we want. Then talk as a family about what truly matters most to you.
- **3. Try It:** Set up a simple obstacle course at home. Go through it once with empty hands and again while carrying bags full of "stuff." How did it feel different? This is like the story Jesus told—sometimes carrying too much can weigh us down. (Adapted from Shannon Kelly, lessonplans.episcopalchurch.org)

4. Wonder Questions:

- I wonder what Jesus wants us to remember about what's most important.
- I wonder how we can live with gratitude instead of worry.
- I wonder what treasures in heaven might look like.

Prayer for Illumination

First Reading Psalm 49:12-20 Dr. Brown Mortals cannot abide in their pomp; they are like the animals that perish. Such is the fate of the foolhardy, the end of those who are pleased with their lot. Like sheep they are appointed for Sheol; Death shall be their shepherd; straight to the grave they descend, and their form shall waste away; Sheol shall be their home. But God will ransom my soul from the

power of Sheol, for he will receive me. Do not be afraid when some become rich, when the wealth of their houses increases. For when they die they will carry nothing away; their wealth will not go down after them. Though in their lifetime they count themselves happy —for you are praised when you do well for yourself—they will go to the company of their ancestors, who will never again see the light. Mortals cannot abide in their pomp; they are like the animals that perish.

Second Reading Luke 12:13-21 Dr. Brown Someone in the crowd said to him, "Teacher, tell my brother to divide the family inheritance with me." But he said to him, "Friend, who set me to be a judge or arbitrator over you?" And he said to them, "Take care! Be on your guard against all kinds of greed; for one's life does not consist in the abundance of possessions." Then he told them a parable: "The land of a rich man produced abundantly. And he thought to himself, "What should I do, for I have no place to store my crops?' Then he said, "I will do this: I will pull down my barns and build larger ones, and there I will store all my grain and my goods. And I will say to my soul, Soul, you have ample goods laid up for many years; relax, eat, drink, be merry.' But God said to him, "You fool! This very night your life is being demanded of you. And the things you have prepared, whose will they be?' So it is with those who store up treasures for themselves but are not rich toward God."

This is the word of the Lord. Thanks be to God!
